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ABOUT US

Special Olympics Singapore (SOSG) was set up in April 1983 as an adjunct committee of the Movement for the Intellectually Disabled of Singapore (MINDS) and the Association for Persons with Special Needs (APSN).

Subsequently it was officially registered as an independent voluntary welfare organisation with the Registrar of Societies on 15 January 1991 and as a charity with the Commissioner of Charities under the Charities Act (Chapter 37) on 22 February 1994.

SOSG's governing instrument is its Constitution approved by the Registry of Societies on 24 June 2022 (Reg 79(a)(i) of Accounts and Annual Report Reg).

SOSG is a certified Institute of Public Character (IPC) organisation and has been accorded IPC (Institution of a Public Character) status from 1 August 2024 - 15 Sep 2027.

SOSG is affiliated to the National Council of Social Service (NCSS) and Singapore National Olympic Council (SNOC).

SOSG is recognised by Sport Singapore as a National Sports Association (NSA) and as a member of the Safe Sport Commission. SOSG is also accredited and recognised as a member of Special Olympics International.

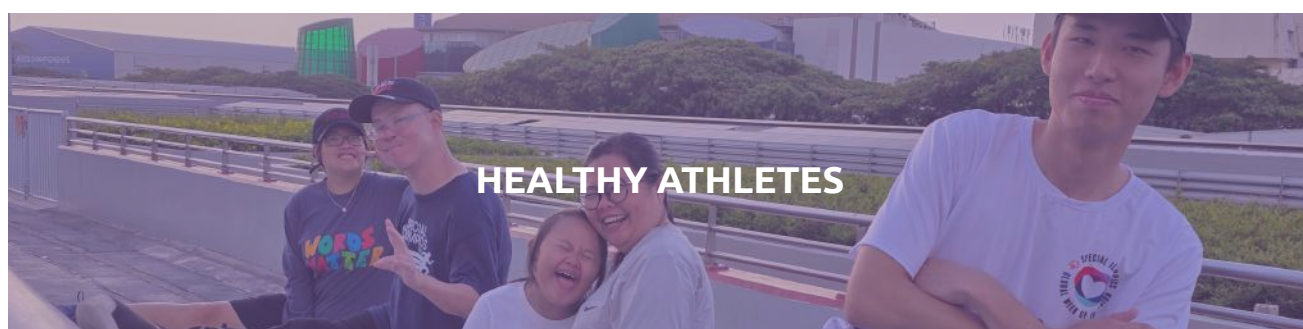

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Financial Year 2025/26 has been a landmark year for Special Olympics Singapore (SOSG), marked by growth, inclusion, and the extraordinary spirit of our athletes and community. Holding steadfast to our mission, SOSG continues to expand opportunities for persons with intellectual disabilities to discover their abilities, develop confidence, and transform their lives through sport.

A defining highlight of the year was the successful return of the 10th Special Olympics Singapore National Games 2025 after an eight years hiatus due to the Covid pandemic. Held from 31 May to 2 June 2025, the National Games brought together more than 500 athletes competing across seven sports, celebrating their determination, courage, and sporting excellence. The event also united over 1,500 volunteers, families, supporters, and numerous corporate partners, many of whom engaged with Special Olympics Singapore for the first time. Their collective support demonstrated the power of sport in bringing communities together and advancing our vision of a more inclusive society.



SOSG also witnessed the continued growth of Play Inclusive 2025, a key signature event initiated in 2018 in collaboration with the Ministry of Education and Sport Singapore. Play Inclusive reached even greater heights this year with increased participation and a wider variety of sports offered than ever before. This meaningful national celebration brought together individuals of all abilities in an environment of inclusion, joy, and mutual respect. It was heartening to see diverse communities come together to embrace inclusion through sport, creating meaningful shared experiences, opportunities for connection, and a celebration of the human spirit.

Beyond Singapore, Team SOSG proudly represented our nation at the 2025 Regional Special Olympics Badminton Competition in Kuala Lumpur. Our athletes demonstrated not only sporting excellence but also courage, resilience, and sportsmanship on the regional stage. Their dedication and determination inspired all of us and reaffirmed the transformative power of sport in building confidence, friendships, and lifelong memories.

Another significant milestone was the strengthening of our Unified Champion Schools initiative through our partnership with Republic Polytechnic. This initiative provided opportunities for our athletes and Republic Polytechnic students to learn and grow together through structured sports programmes such as Rock Climbing and Canoeing. These experiences fostered genuine inclusion and friendship between persons with and without intellectual disabilities. Such partnerships go beyond sport—they help shape a more compassionate and inclusive society by empowering young people to become advocates for inclusion.

While sport remains at the heart of everything we do, SOSG's impact extends beyond the field of play. Through initiatives such as Athlete Leadership, Young Athletes, and Healthy Athletes, we continue to provide meaningful pathways for individuals with intellectual disabilities to develop holistically, build life skills, strengthen their voices, and lead healthier, more independent lives.

These achievements would not have been possible without the unwavering support of our donors, sponsors, partners, volunteers, caregivers, coaches, and staff. Your generosity, commitment, and belief in our mission continue to create opportunities for our athletes to thrive and shine both on and off the field of play.

BOARD OF SPECIAL OLYMPICS SINGAPORE

Special Olympics Singapore is governed by a Board, the governing body responsible for overseeing and managing a charity. Special Olympics Singapore is led by the Board's Management Committee, comprising of the 5 appointment holders. Reporting to the governing board are Committees that look into specific areas such as Audit, Finance & Investment and Human Resources.

In Special Olympics Singapore's board of 14 members, there are an equal number of male and female board members represented.

Term Limit of Board

To enable succession planning and steady renewal in the spirit of sustainability of the charity, the Board has an updated term limit of eight years as stated in the amended Constitution approved by ROS on 24th June 2022. In particular, the Honorary Treasurer has a term limit of four years.

Prior to the amended Constitution in 2022, all office-bearers may be re-elected to the same or related post for consecutive terms of office with the exception of the Honorary Treasurer. Hence there are some current Board members who have worked consecutively in the Board for the immediate past 10 years before the change in SOSG Constitution in 2022.

TERMS OF REFERENCE

+ AUDIT & RISK MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Internal control:

- Ensure that effective and efficient internal controls are in place, with documented procedures, for finance matters, including:
 - Procurement procedures and controls
 - Quotations and Tenders procedures and controls
 - Receipting and Payment procedures and controls
 - Inventory control
 - Accounting for Fixed Assets
 - A system for the delegation of authority and limits of approval

Internal Audit:

- Ensure that periodic internal audits are carried out on controls, processes, key programmes, fundraising events and activities.

External Audit:

- Review the appointment and fees of the Honorary/External Auditor(s).

Audit Review:

- Liaise with the Auditor(s) and review the annual audit plan, audit work performed and audit findings and recommendations.
- Oversee compliance with statutory responsibilities relating to financial reporting and disclosure requirements.

Investigations:

- Oversee special investigations when required by the Board.

+ COMMUNICATIONS, PARTNERSHIP & FUNDRAISING COMMITTEE

- Ensure that all actions carried out are in line with Special Olympics Singapore Communication Policy.
- Publish quarterly newsletters for Special Olympics Singapore highlighting the key events and achievements.
- Ensure that the newsletter permit from IMDA remains valid prior to publication of the newsletter.
- Actively update social media platforms such as Instagram, Facebook etc. on Special Olympics Singapore events to raise awareness.
- Collaborate with external agencies such as Sport Singapore, Singapore National Olympics Council, Special Olympics Asia-Pacific and Sponsors to ensure unceasing support.
- Be the bridge between external media and Special Olympics Singapore to ensure that the organisation is correctly portrayed at all times.

+ DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE

- Attend to complaints made to SOSG regarding any alleged disciplinary offence by support personnel, including team managers, physiotherapists, psychologists, masseurs, sport trainers and others; coaches and assistant coaches; athletes; referees, umpires and other officials; volunteers ; other personnel participating in events and activities, including camps and training sessions, held or sanctioned by Special Olympics Singapore; and any other person including families, spectators, parents/guardians of the athletes
- To conduct a full inquiry on complaints brought to the attention of SOSG Discipline Committee by the public or members of SOSG for breaching professional conduct and/or violating the SOSG Code of Conduct and/or committing a criminal offence. The purpose of the inquiry is to gather all the relevant facts of the case and provide a fair hearing to the person/persons so as to ensure that any disciplinary action taken is fair and just.
- Any such hearing and decision shall be in accordance with these terms of reference and any other rules, regulations and procedures established from time to time by the SOSG Board of Governance.
- A “disciplinary offence” refers to any of the following:
 - (i) A violation of the SOSG Code of Conduct.
 - (ii) Criminal activity perpetrated on SOSG property or premises, or during or in connection with sanctioned SOSG activities /events.
 - (iii) A violation of any SOI or SOSG rules, regulations, or policies, or any other conduct associated with an event, activity or program operated

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

+ SPECIAL OLYMPICS ASIA PACIFIC REGIONAL BADMINTON COMPETITION KUALA LUMPUR 2025

Special Olympics Singapore (SOSG) sent a 8-member delegation to Kuala Lumpur for the Special Olympics Asia Pacific Badminton Competition 2025. The Team was led by Head of Delegation, Ms Tay Su Yin, Senior Manager of SOSG and supported by 2 coaches, Ms Sunarti Binte Abdul Samat and Mr Loh Ding Jie.

This was the first time that Special Olympics Malaysia organised and hosted delegations from 10 Asia Pacific countries competing in traditional and Unified formats of Badminton competition.

Ms Jamie Li Rui Xuan, a 19 year-old SUSS student, partnered with Ms Haney Natasha Bte Hamdan, a 18 year-old Food & Beverage student from APSN Delta Senior School, for the Women's Unified Doubles event. "My goal for this competition is to help my partner (Haney) gain more confidence and make more friends! I have already made 4 new friends during training!" (Ms Jamie Li, SOSG Unified Partner)

The Special Olympics Asia Pacific Badminton Competition kicked-off on 17 September 2025 with 80 badminton players, including 63 athletes with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) and 17 unified partners, who do not have disabilities and play sport alongside the athletes.

Held between 17 to 20 September 2025 at Stadium Juara, Bukit Kiara, Kuala Lumpur, the regional competition, alongside other year-round Special Olympics initiatives, expands inclusive sports and competition opportunities for people with IDD in Asia Pacific, who routinely face stigma, social exclusion, and bias.



Regional Competitions



The opening ceremony encompassed an athlete march-in from delegations across 10 different countries including delegations from Special Olympics Bangladesh, Special Olympics Bharat, Special Olympics Indonesia, Special Olympics Maldives, Special Olympics Pakistan, Special Olympics Papua New Guinea, Special Olympics Pilipinas, Special Olympics Singapore, Special Olympics Thailand, and host country, Special Olympics Malaysia.

There were also speeches from Pn. Siti Mariam binti Ahmad Tobias, Director, Sports Development for Persons with Disabilities Branch, National Youth and Sports Department; Bong Koi Sin, President of Special Olympics Malaysia and Dipak Natali, Regional President and Managing Director of Special Olympics Asia Pacific.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

+ PLAY INCLUSIVE 2025

Play Inclusive, Singapore's largest inclusive sports competition, returned for its eighth edition this year, bringing inclusive sports experiences to more communities than before. Held on 22 and 23 August 2025, the two-day event brought together more than 2,200 participants. This includes 1,200 athletes and unified partners in the various sports competitions, as well as students and members of the public who participated in the learning journeys, tryouts, and activities across multiple venues at the Singapore Sports Hub. Over 500 volunteers from Team Nila, schools, corporates, and public agencies supported the programme, showcasing the growing reach of inclusive sports across the nation.

As a key strategic move of the refreshed Disability Sports Master Plan announced in 2024, the aim is to more than double Play Inclusive's outreach from 1,200 to 3,000 participants by 2030. This will create more opportunities for communities to connect, compete and celebrate one another through sport.

The main highlight of the event – the inclusive sports competition – which is culmination of a three-month training period for athletes and their unified partners, featured a total of 10 sports this year, including badminton, basketball, boccia, floorball, football, goalball, soundball, wheelchair rugby, and football and basketball skills challenges (See Annex A for the sports competition offerings and its target group).

Play Inclusive 2025 was officially declared open by Guest-of-Honour Ms Low Yen Ling, Senior Minister of State, Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth & Ministry of Trade and Industry. In celebration of SG60 this year, the SG60 Voices of Inclusion flag was unveiled during the ceremony. Created with contributions from mainstream and special education schools, the flag symbolises Singapore's journey towards a more inclusive society, reflecting unity and a collective commitment to inclusion in sport and society.



National Competitions



Mr Marcus Tan, Chief of Sport Development Group, who oversees Sport Singapore's philanthropic arm SportCares, said, "Play Inclusive is more than a competition — it's a platform that brings people together to experience and celebrate inclusive sport. In this SG60 year, the event reflects the spirit of unity and inclusion, as engagement grows across schools, corporates, volunteers, and the wider community. Through initiatives like the learning journeys and unified sports activities, we are creating opportunities for everyone to connect, learn, and participate — helping to build a Singapore where inclusive sport is truly a lived experience for all. We hope to expand its reach to even more communities in the years ahead, supporting our broader goal of enabling more people to experience the benefits of inclusive sport."

Dr Teo-Koh Sock Miang, President of Special Olympics Singapore and Singapore Disability Sports Council, said, "Play Inclusive, as a national initiative to promote unified sports, continues to serve as a vital platform for fostering understanding, inclusion, and shared learning."



Through strategic collaboration with Ministry of Education, corporate and volunteer unified partners have opportunities to train alongside athletes with special needs from special schools, outreach disability sport programmes and other allied social service agencies. We continue to be heartened to witness the consistent display of empathy, teamwork, and sportsmanship among all participants, reaffirming the transformative power of unified sports."



HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

+ SPECIAL OLYMPICS SINGAPORE 10TH NATIONAL GAMES 2025

The 10th National Games organised by Special Olympics Singapore was a landmark celebration of inclusion, determination and sporting excellence, bringing together one of the largest gatherings of athletes with intellectual disabilities after a hiatus of 8 years. Held from 31 May to 2 June 2025, the Games saw over 550 athletes with intellectual disabilities compete across seven sports — DanceSport, Football, Badminton, Bocce, Track & Field, Bowling and Swimming.

Over three action-packed days, athletes showcased not only their sporting abilities, but also the courage, discipline and perseverance developed through months of training and preparation. Every competition venue was filled with excitement, encouragement and celebration as athletes proudly represented their schools, organisations and teams.

A key feature of the National Games is the Olympic Village experience hosted at the National University of Singapore. Athletes stayed together on campus, experiencing the camaraderie and independence of living as part of a major multi-sport event. For many, it was their first opportunity to be part of such an immersive sporting environment, creating unforgettable memories and lasting friendships beyond the field of play.

The Games would not have been possible without the incredible support of more than 1,500 volunteers, coaches, officials and supporters who dedicated their time and energy to ensuring the success of the event. Their passion and commitment created a welcoming and empowering environment where every athlete could perform with confidence and pride.



National Competitions



The highlight of the Games was undoubtedly the spectacular Opening Ceremony held at Bishan Stadium. The ceremony was graced by the President of the Republic of Singapore, Tharman Shanmugaratnam, whose presence underscored the importance of inclusion and equal opportunities for persons with intellectual disabilities. Athletes marched proudly into the stadium to the cheers of supporters, while performances, celebrations and the ceremonial lighting moments created an atmosphere of excitement and unity that truly captured the spirit of Special Olympics.

In contrast, the Closing Ceremony provided a warm and intimate conclusion to the Games. It was an opportunity for athletes to relax, celebrate their achievements and simply enjoy themselves with teammates and friends.

Filled with music, laughter and dancing, the evening reflected the joy and friendships that define the Special Olympics movement.

The 10th National Games 2025 was more than a sporting competition — it was a powerful reminder of how sport can unite communities, inspire confidence and create a more inclusive society where every individual is celebrated for their abilities.

PROGRAMMES AND INITIATIVES

+ ATHLETE LEADERSHIP

At Special Olympics Singapore, we believe that every individual has the potential to lead, inspire and create meaningful change. Through our Athlete Leadership initiatives, we empower persons with intellectual disabilities to grow beyond sports and develop the confidence and skills needed to thrive in everyday life. Our programmes provide opportunities for athletes to strengthen their communication, teamwork and social interaction skills, enabling them to become advocates for inclusion within their communities. By creating platforms for athletes to share their experiences, take on leadership roles and contribute actively to society, we are redefining what leadership looks like. The journeys of our athlete leaders demonstrate resilience, determination and the ability to inspire others regardless of ability. Through sport and leadership development, we continue to build a more inclusive community where individuals with intellectual disabilities are recognised not only for their talents, but also for their voices, contributions and potential to lead others.

Athlete Leadership Programme



ALP Workshops with NUS Youth Leaders

Youth leaders from the National University of Singapore (NUS) conducted a series of engaging and practical monthly workshops for the athlete leaders of Special Olympics Singapore from December 2024. Designed to enhance digital literacy and workplace readiness, the sessions covered essential skills such as using Google Calendar for scheduling, composing professional emails, creating visually impactful presentations with Canva, and organizing files efficiently with Google Drive.

The workshops provided a supportive environment where athlete leaders could build confidence in using these tools, which are increasingly important for both personal and professional growth. The NUS youth leaders demonstrated strong mentorship, guiding the athletes through hands-on activities and offering individual support as needed.

To further strengthen camaraderie and team spirit, the program culminated in a fun-filled Amazing Race team building activity held at the Singapore Zoo. This interactive experience encouraged collaboration, problem-solving, and friendship, reinforcing the values of inclusion and mutual respect. The event was a meaningful blend of learning, leadership, and laughter—truly embodying the spirit of empowerment and community.



PROGRAMMES AND INITIATIVES

+ YOUNG ATHLETES PROGRAMME

Our SOSG's Young Athletes programme 2024 was held from 20 September to 1 November 2025, for a total of 34 children with and without intellectual disabilities.

Weekly Young Athletes sessions were conducted at Bendemeer Secondary School, culminating in the Young Athletes Ribbons Day held at the school. This year's programme was further strengthened through the support of Youth Corps Singapore volunteers, who came on board as dedicated Young Athletes Buddies, providing encouragement and companionship to the children throughout the sessions.

The Young Athletes Ribbons Day served as a fun-filled mini sports carnival where young athletes and their families could come together to celebrate achievements, participate in activities and showcase the skills they had developed over the course of the programme. Building on the popularity of last year's fringe activities, Athlete Leader Hay Qing Hui and a team of fellow Athlete Leaders returned to delight the children with creative balloon sculptures, bringing smiles and excitement to the event.



To conclude the day, members of the FSN committee and their children shared their personal experiences and journeys with parents of the Young Athletes. Their heartfelt stories created meaningful conversations, encouragement and a sense of community among families. The event was a memorable and impactful experience that celebrated inclusion, connection and the joy of coming together through sport and shared experiences.



PROGRAMMES AND INITIATIVES

+ FUNDRAISING/DONATIONS

In FY2025/26, Special Olympics Singapore continued to strengthen partnerships with corporates, foundations, and community supporters to raise vital funds that enable athletes with intellectual disabilities to access year-round sports training, competitions, health programmes, and leadership opportunities.

+ FUNDRAISING PLANS FOR FY2026/2027

In FY2026/27, Special Olympics Singapore will continue to strengthen its fundraising efforts to ensure that athletes with intellectual disabilities have access to quality sports training, competitions, health programmes, and leadership development opportunities.

A key focus for the year will be the launch of two online fundraising campaigns through Giving.sg. The first campaign will support athlete development programmes, helping to provide year-round sports training, coaching, equipment, and opportunities for athletes to build confidence, skills, and independence through sport. Funds raised will contribute towards creating inclusive sporting environments where every athlete can reach their fullest potential.

The second campaign will focus on supporting Team Singapore athletes representing the nation at regional and international Special Olympics Games and competitions. Donations will help offset the costs associated with overseas participation, including travel, accommodation, competition expenses, and preparation programmes. These experiences provide athletes with valuable opportunities to showcase their abilities on the world stage, develop leadership skills, and serve as ambassadors for inclusion.

In addition to raising funds, both campaigns will seek to increase public awareness of the capabilities and achievements of persons with intellectual disabilities, encouraging greater community involvement and support for the Special Olympics movement.

Through the generosity of donors, partners, volunteers, and supporters, Special Olympics Singapore aims to continue expanding opportunities for athletes to train, compete, and thrive, while advancing its mission of fostering inclusion and empowerment through sport.



+ EXPENDITURE PLAN

In tandem with securing funding, SOSG has meticulously planned its expenditure for the fiscal year 2025/26 to ensure operational efficiency.

The key expenditure items are as follows:

- 1. Manpower and Office Operating Costs:** SOSG has allocated resources towards manpower costs, covering salaries for a team of 10 staff members and interns. Resources are also allocated for staff to upskill and upgrade themselves. Administrative efficiency is ensured through provisions for general office operating costs.
- 2. Sports & National Competitions:** Sports-related expenditures include provisions for venue and facility bookings, as well as prizes for competitions associated with various national competitions and events.
- 3. Overseas Competitions:** Special Olympics Singapore has allocated resources towards 2 regional competitions between Sep-Dec 2026, and also preparations for training of athletes and coaches who would be representing Singapore at the Special Olympics World Summer Games Santiago 2027 in Oct 2027.
- 4. Volunteer Management:** Volunteers form the backbone of the work we do at Special Olympics Singapore, hence we put aside resources for training and upskilling our volunteers to deliver even better quality programmes for our special athletes.

Through this structured approach to fundraising and expenditure management, SOSG is poised to grow a robust set of services and programmes, promoting inclusivity and engagement for our Special Olympics Singapore community.

POLICIES

+ CONFLICT OF INTEREST

SOSG adopted the policy of declaration by the Board and staff of any personal interest that may affect the integrity, fairness and accountability to SOSG. When a situation arises when there is a conflict of interest, the member or staff shall abstain from participating in the discussion, decision making and voting on the matter. Board, committee members and staff signed a declaration to acknowledge the conflict of interest policy. A conflict of interest clause is also included in each staff's employment terms and conditions.

+ RESERVES POLICY

Special Olympics Singapore has a reserve policy for long-term stability of the operations and it ensures that there are sufficient resources to support the charity in the event of unforeseen circumstances. Reserves are set aside to provide financial stability and the means for the development of the principal activities of the Society. It is the policy of the Society to build reserves, from operating surplus, to an amount equivalent to two years worth of budgeted total annual operating expenses.

The Society maintains restricted and unrestricted funds. Funds set up for specific purposes are classified as restricted funds. All income, expenses and common overheads, other than those attributable to restricted funds, are recorded in the unrestricted fund's statement of comprehensive income.

None of the funds is in deficit position at the end of the year 31 Mar 2026.

How and What to Report

Whistle-blowers may use any of the available communication channels mentioned in the above section to report their concerns.

To enable Special Olympics Singapore to effectively investigate your concerns, the following information should be provided, where possible:

Name(s) of person(s)/company(ies) involved;

Date, time and location of incident;

Frequency of occurrence of incident;

Value of any money or assets involved;

Physical evidence (if any);

Any other information that may substantiate the concern;

Disclosures should be made in good faith. If a report is made in good faith, but a case of wrongdoing cannot be established after investigation, no action will be taken against the reporting officer. If, however, an allegation is made frivolously, maliciously or for personal gain, disciplinary action may be taken against the whistle-blower.

We encourage whistle-blowers to put their names to the allegations in case further information or clarification is required. To the extent feasible and permissible under the law, Special Olympics Singapore will make every effort not to reveal the identity of the whistle-blower.

Types of Improprieties

Possible improprieties include but are not limited to the following:

+ FRAUD

This generally relates to the use of deception or misrepresentation to obtain an unjust advantage. It can also involve the theft or misappropriation of SOSG's assets.

+ CORRUPT CONDUCT

Corrupt conduct can take many forms including seeking, obtaining or offering secret commissions, theft, embezzlement, forgery, misuse of information, documents or materials acquired in the course of employment and dishonest performance of functions.

+ QUESTIONABLE ACCOUNTING AND AUDITING PRACTICES

Broadly, this refers to practices that do not comply with accounting or auditing standards, or are fraudulent or deceptive.

+ IMPROPER CONDUCT OR UNETHICAL BEHAVIOUR

This can involve illegal behaviour, including drug sale or use, violence or threatened violence, criminal damage against property and serious breaches against SOSG's code of conduct. This includes the participation in or condoning a reportable wrongdoing through willful suppression or concealment of any information relating to a wrongdoing.

+ ENDANGERING THE HEALTH OR SAFETY OF PERSONS OR THE ENVIRONMENT

This refers to any actions that could possibly endanger the health or safety of athletes, volunteers, staff and any others that are involved in our programs.

+ SAFE SPORT COMMITMENT

Purpose

- To protect the interests of Athletes, Staffs, Volunteers, Coaches & Officials in our sport from harassment and abuse.
- To outline the principles that guide our approach to safeguarding and protecting Athletes, Staffs, Volunteers, Coaches & Officials
- To adopt practices and outline standards of behaviour
- To establish a safe sport culture that is understood, endorsed and put into action by Management Committee who work for, volunteer or access our activities, courses, events and programmes

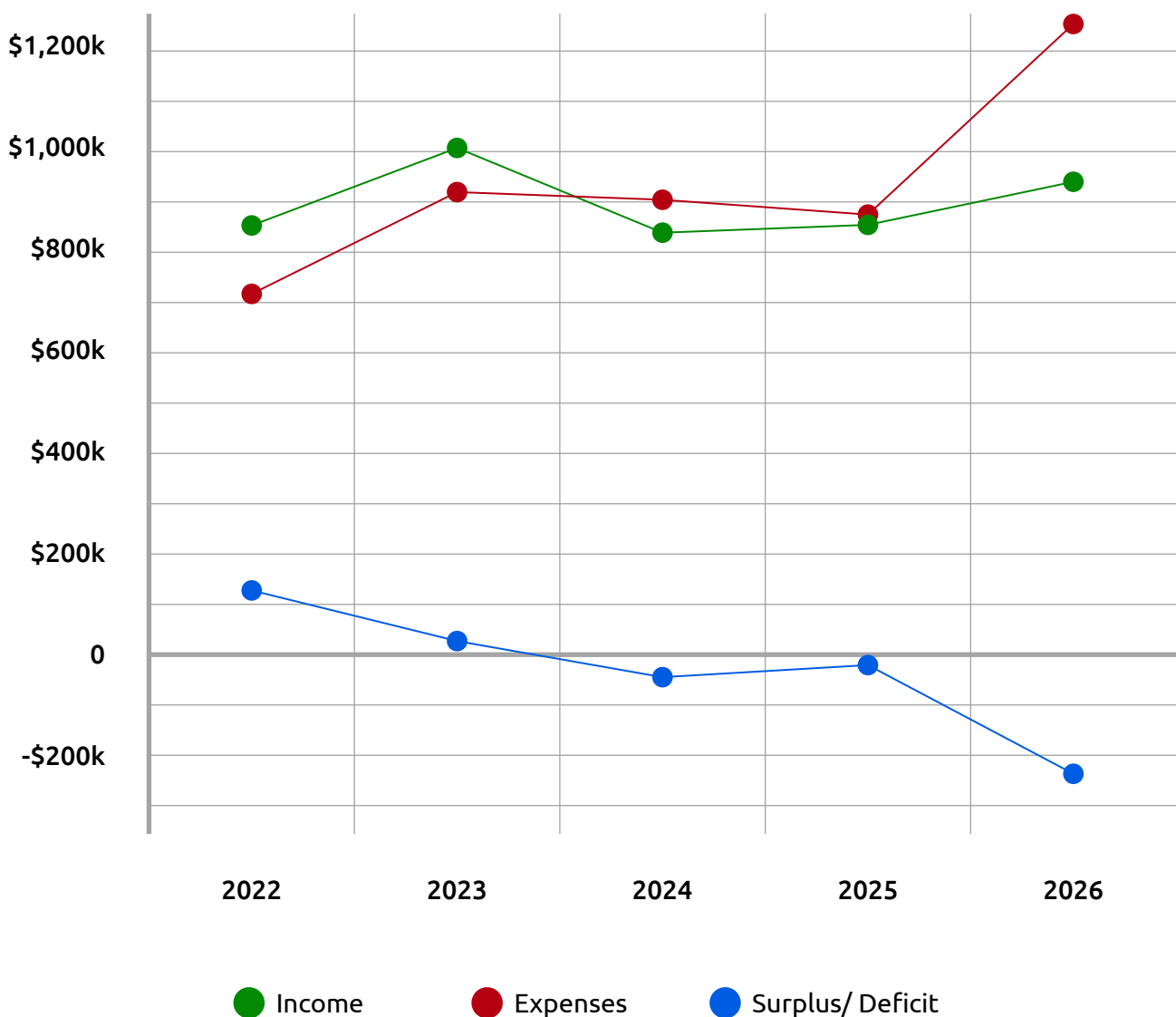

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

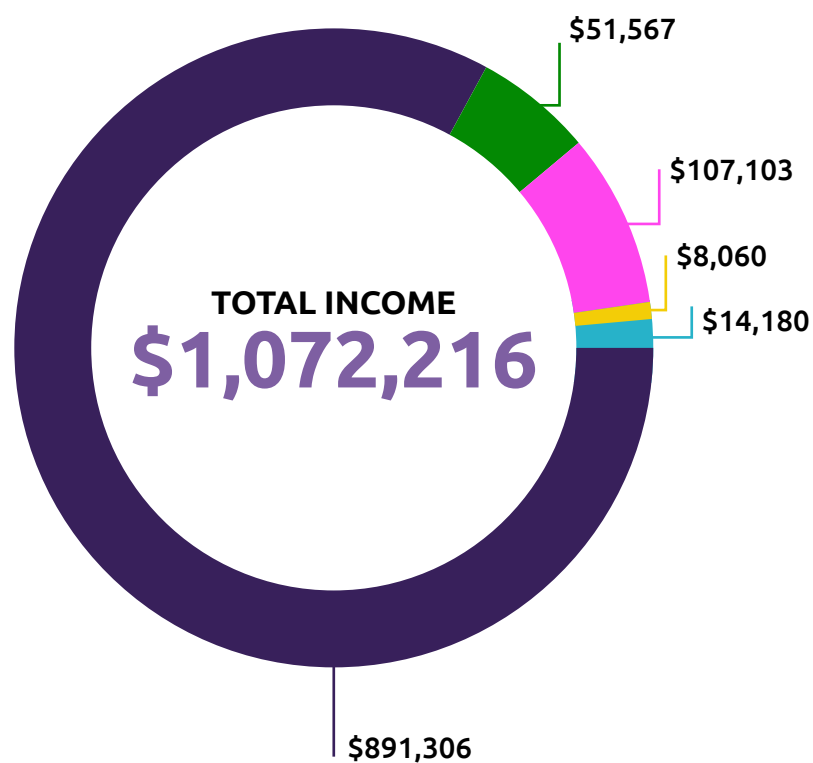

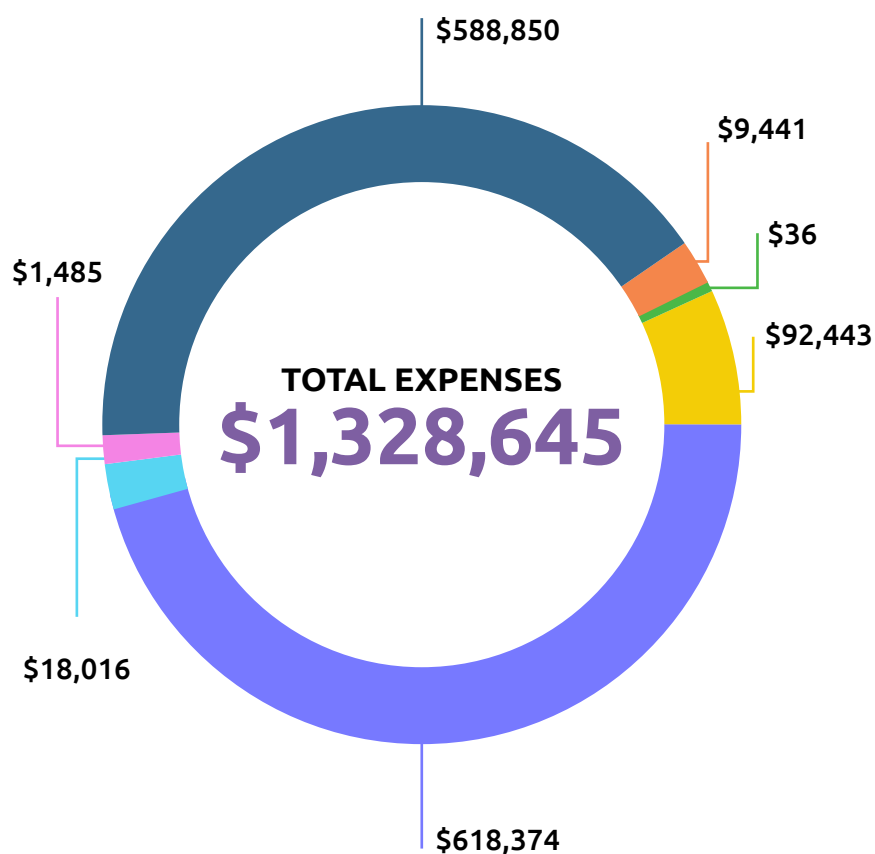
